I. Background of the report

This report summarizes the interventions carried out by IFOSuD in Haiti for the quarter started April 1st, 2026 to June 30th, 2026.

During this period, Haiti's socio-economic situation remained marked by complex structural challenges, including market instability, persistent logistical difficulties, and an urgent need for food security and financial autonomy within rural and peri-urban communities. Faced with these realities, strengthening local capacities remains the most reliable lever for building sustainable resilience.

True to its mission of promoting endogenous and sustainable development, IFOSuD focused its quarterly efforts on providing technical support, evangelism, training, and economic empowerment to its beneficiaries and local partners. IFOSUD projects aims to transform current vulnerabilities into opportunities for economic growth by providing communities with the necessary tools to stabilize their incomes and improve their living conditions. For the period of the report:

- 144 farmers have received training in the Farmer Field School (94 in Leogane and 50 in Jacmel),
- 73 beneficiaries have already received their microloans.
- 327 FFH students are regularly enrolled in the Agric program
- 6 agronomists coming from Haiti United partner's network (Lifesong for Orphans, Calvary Chapel PAP and Crossworld /UEBH) in the north region have attended one (1) month of intensive FFH Training (Training of Trainers) in the IFOSUD training facility.

- 25 grass roots church planters from 25 local churches have received 3 days intensive training on communication bridge to Oral culture, the ancient path (The Art of Story-telling, Oral culture) in the IFOSUD training Facility

This report highlights the key achievements, challenges overcome, and measurable impacts of the activities deployed by IFOSUD-Haiti during the second quarter ending on June 30th, 2026.

II- Key activities for the quarter (Q2)

2.1 Evangelism program

While preaching brings spiritual nourishment, action-based evangelism cares for the "whole person." This includes creating youth Agriculture and Farmer Field School programs that build character and leadership, ultimately pointing the beneficiaries toward Christ.

Evangelism through action—living out the Gospel through tangible service—is vital in Haiti because it addresses the communities' profound physical and psychological trauma while authentically reflecting Christ's love. It builds necessary trust, counters cycles of systemic despair, and directly meets the desperate, immediate needs of the people we serve.

For the second quarter, IFOSUD continue to reach out communities for Christ through our unique model **“Evangelism through Social Actions (EtSA)”**. Again, to reach out our target community for Christ, we used several mechanisms like Story-telling in small group (orality approach) of adults, memorizing bible verses, family conference, Christian movies projection, group devotions, group discussions and household discipleship visits. In addition, we have the AWANA (Approved Workmen Are Not Ashamed) program which allowed us to reach the heart of the FFH children for Christ through weekly devotions and monthly AWANA club. Hereafters are the achievements from April 1st, 2026 to June 30th, 2026.

Orality training for grass roots church planters (Communication Bridges to Oral Cultures)

Since the tower of Babel, man has been divided by a multitude of languages and cultures. In modern times the clash has deepened between cultures, ideologies and values, between geographic regions, between ethnic boundaries and even between East and West. It is within this framework that cross cultural church planters must effectively communicate God's message. Our work is to learn the process of building bridges of communication. Planting a church and properly discipline those who cannot read is a tremendous challenge. This course is designed to be a very simple introduction to a few of the basic concepts of communication with non-literates focusing on Scripture Storytelling.

For this quarter, we organized a three day intensive training with 25 grass roots church planters and covered the following lessons with them:

- Lesson 1. Differences between Communication Styles
- Lesson 2. The Importance of the Native Language

- Lesson 3. Jesus as Storyteller
- Lesson 4. The Essentials of Storytelling
- Lesson 5. Storytelling and Apostolic Teams
- Lesson 6. The Circular Process of Church Planting
- Lesson 7. God's Story
- Lesson 8. The Power of Parables
- Lesson 9. Discipleship through Storytelling
- Lesson 10. Music and Poetry as Oral Art

As overall, we have achieved the following spiritual outcomes:

- ✓ 18 AWANA Club sessions with an average of 327 FFH children were taken place in the following school community: Morne Barbeau, Bongnotte, Netirans, Darbonne, Corail Lemaire and Laberger.
- ✓ 69 devotions with Farmer Field School and 65 with FFH children
- ✓ 139 household discipleship visit to Farmer Field School, 676 household discipleship visit to FFH students.
- ✓ 1 evangelism movie was projected
- ✓ 3 days of Orality training with 25 grass roots church planters coming from 25 local churches in the community where IFOSUD intervened

- ✓ 66 daily devotions sessions and bible study (chapter by chapter, verse by verse) have been realized in IFOSUD office with office employees. And 3 monthly devotions (usually take place every last Sunday in a month). For the second quarter, we have studied the following books: Psalm and Proverb.

2.2 FOLLOW UP WITH THE GENERAL PROJECT ACTIVITIES

A- Farmer Field School Program (FFS_p)

A Farmer Field Schools (FFS) is a group-based adult learning approach that teaches farmers how to experiment and solve problems independently. Sometimes called “schools without walls”, in FFS groups of farmers meet regularly with a facilitator, observe, talk, ask questions, and learn together. Farmer field schools as an approach was first developed to teach Integrated Pest Management (IPM) techniques in rice farming, but it has also been used in organic agriculture, animal husbandry, and also non-farm income generating activities such as handicrafts, small business, ect.

Based on IFOSUD strategic plan, adults farmers in the Farmer Field School (FFS) are trained and equipped upon a period of two years; whereby, a maximum of 50 beneficiaries is selected based on specific criteria. In order to address their training needs, the group is usually split into 3 sub-sectors: Agriculture/ crop production, livestock and small business per target community. During this quarter, we continue to serve three (3) communities: LABERGER (47 beneficiaries), MAPOU BUISSONNIÈRE (47 beneficiaries) located in Leogane and COQ CHANTE (50 beneficiaries) located in Jacmel.

A1- Sub-sector of Crop Producers

In Haiti, farmers are extremely vulnerable to climate hazards (droughts, hurricanes, floods). These shocks, exacerbated by deforestation and erosion, regularly devastate crops and severely impact food security. However, IFOSuD, in its support plan, is experimenting with 144 farmers on agricultural practices that protect the soil and the environment holistically. Indeed, for this quarter, we have studied the following themes with them:

✓ Plant Propagation Techniques

- **Cuttings (rooting a fragment),**
- Layering (burying a stem to make it root before separation),
- and Grafting (joining one variety onto another)

✓ Soil and water conservation techniques

✓ Technical sheet and practical session on vegetable crops production

- Tomato, Pepper (sweet and hot), Cabbage, Carrot, Okra, Cucumber,...

✓ Natural Insecticide Production

✓ Garden Maintenance in farm management

For the period of the report, 18 microloans were disbursed to 18 crop producers for an amount of \$ 3,600USD (average loan size \$ 200 USD). By the next quarter, the collection of loan reimbursement will be tackled. The loan maturity is between 3 months and 5 months with 2 to 4 months of grace period depending of the crops cycle.

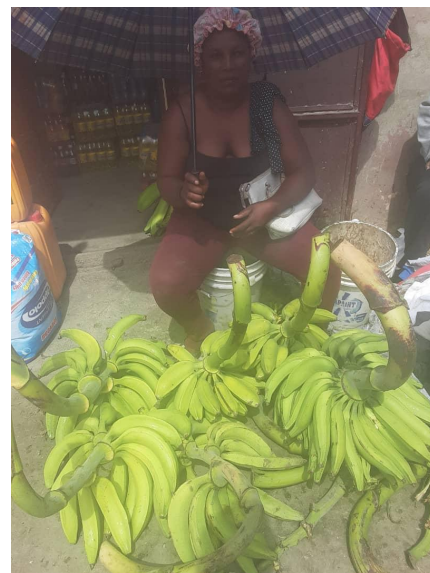
A2- Sub-sector of Small Business

According to Sinior Raymond from ACME, 90% of Haiti's entrepreneurial fabric comprises micro, small and medium enterprises (MSMEs). These are deemed of strategic importance to the Haitian economy in terms of job creation and they also have great potential for wealth creation, in both rural

and urban areas. But MSMEs are particularly vulnerable and are struggling to juggle between short-term survival and medium- and long-term growth strategies.

As part of the IFOSUD discipleship program, a business curriculum is set in order to enable our small business ladies to thrive in their business with discipline. For the period of the report, we have covered the following topic with them:

- ✓ Returned merchandise,
- ✓ Discount
- ✓ Rebate,
- ✓ Sales price fixing

For the period of the report, 29 microloans were disbursed to 29 small Business ladies for an amount of \$ 5,800 USD (average loan size is \$200 USD). The loan reimbursement is being collected. For this quarter an amount of \$ 2464.45 USD is already collected. The loan maturity is 6 months with monthly installment.

A3- Sub-sector of livestock

Small ruminant farming (mainly goats and sheep) is a pillar of the Haitian rural economy, representing more than 90% of national production. This livestock farming acts as a "walking savings bank" for farming households: the animals are sold to cover urgent expenses (school fees, medical care, seeds) and provide an essential source of meat protein. Furthermore, poultry is a potential activity that helps farmers to cope with short term needs.

In the framework of the IFOSUD discipleship program, a livestock curriculum is set in order to enable our smallholder farmers to thrive in their cattle and poultry business with discipline. For the period of the report, we have covered the following topic with them:

✓ **Chicken breed**

- layer (Legorne, ISA Brown, Bovon Brown)
- broiler chickens (Cobb500/Ross308, broiler)
- mixed breed chicken : Rhode Island, Plymouth Rock (egg and meat)

✓ **Why we should raise chickens?**

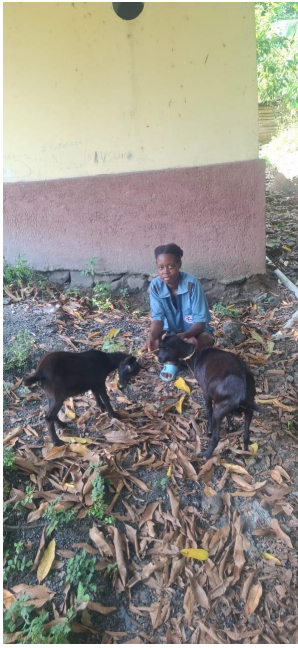

For the period of the report, 26 microloans were disbursed to 26 small livestock farmers for an amount of \$ 5200 USD (average loan size is \$200 USD). The loan reimbursement will be in kind. Have 2 goat/ sheep as loan and reimburse 4 goats' kids/ sheep kids. The loan maturity is 2 years with gradual installment.

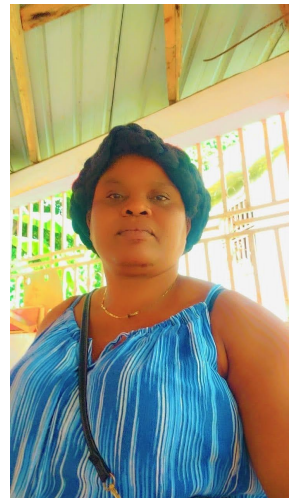

Thanks to the spiritual part of IFOSuD evangelism training, I am hoping to take back my place again at church, because I feel God's presence missing me and it creates a great emptiness within me. The spiritual part is my favorite part in IFOSUD program.

Regarding the small business, I am a fruit seller. Before, I couldn't really manage the business; I used to give away most the fruits as gifts and never keeping record of the transactions. Thanks to the small business training and the microloan that IFOSuD issued to me, I am an entrepreneur now and I feel that my business has really grown. The profit earned helps me to take care of my children and to re-invest in my business. Please consider to pray for me for my spiritual condition. B. FUTURE FARMERS OF HAITI (FFH)

IFOSuD is implementing an educational agriculture project, which is an agricultural indoctrination project, in the commune of Leogane. This project, entitled "Future Farmers of Haiti (FFH)," consists of providing theoretical and practical training sessions to students from 4th to 7th grade. This represents a four-year training period. The project aims to engage these young students in agriculture to ensure the sustainability of farms. It is a dynamic initiative designed to foster a connection between young people and agriculture.

Since 2020, we have already worked with Nine (9) schools. For the period of the report, six (6) schools are currently enrolled in the project. Hereafter are the following:

- Ecole Mixte Etoile de l'Avenir in Darbonne,
- Institution Mixte d'Application Pédagogique in Corail Lemaire,
- Ecole Phoenix in Laberger (9th section Citronnier),
- Ecole Chrétienne Espoir in Morne Barbeau, Institution Clé d'Or in Netirans,
- Ecole Evangélique Pèlerins in Bongnotte.

To conduct the training sessions with the students, six (6) agronomists were hired by IFOSUD. Each Agronomist is assisted by an agronomist intern who actively participates in all the training activities at the schools and also conducts home visits to ensure that the students' individual plots are prepared in accordance with the instructions given in the classroom by the agricultural instructors.

IFOSuD continues to work with students from various schools as part of its "Future Farmers of Haiti-FFH" project. The objective of this initiative is to enroll second-cycle fundamental students in the field of agriculture to ensure the sustainability of farms. They benefit not only from agricultural training sessions, but also from evangelistic activities (learning songs, Bible stories and verses, Christian films, etc.) with the aim of giving them knowledge about the Bible and encouraging them to put God's Word into practice

As of now, we can count 148 graduates in the FFH program. The wheel continues to run until the change occurs across Haiti at national level. ***To do so, a post-graduation follow up is a must. To***

keep them in the Ag business a new step is important, which is to provide funding and coaching to keep the graduates in business.

Expansion plan of the FFH program

Given the impact of the FFH program, as an agricultural indoctrination program, on children and the country of Haiti, some organizations working with children expressed interest in replicating this program in their communities. It is in this context that several organizations within the Haiti United network, including Lifesong for Orphans, Calvary Chapel PAP, and Cross world, contacted IFOSuD to send their agronomists to participate in the FFH Training of Trainers.

From May 20, 2026, to June 23, 2026, theoretical and practical training sessions were conducted. Pre- and post-tests were administered. Upon completion of the training, 6 participants have received a certificate as **FFH Trainers**. Furthermore, IFOSuD will provide these new trainers with a number of agronomists who have completed a year-long internship with IFOSuD in the field to mentor them for a period of time.

For the new academic year (2026-2027), a new FFH chapter will open in Northern Haiti with at least six new schools. We wish them every success and happiness in implementing this program.



Upcoming FFH graduation announcement

We are thrilled to announce the third FFH graduation for this year. ***It will take place on the last Sunday of October this year (October 25th, 2026) at the Discipleship and Agriculture Training Center in Leogane.*** Therefore, 70 candidates are about to prepare their final test (theory and

practical exam) in order to know who will be eligible to graduate. Coming up soon with the exact number of graduates. Again, this year who will be the best FFH student? A Boy or a Girl? Coming up soon with more updates.

2.3.2 Irregular project

Irregular project is defined here as any partnership and /or being a winner through a call for tender or subsidy launched by another development organization in Haiti. In this manner this irregular projects can be totally or partly funded by a different organization. Even though this project purpose in the

partners' perspective is not evangelism, IFOSUD takes this opportunity seriously as way to tell more people about Jesus. For this quarter, IFOSUD has a formal partnership with the following:

- 1- Partners Worldwide:** Partners Worldwide is a global community of Christians dedicated to ending poverty by harnessing the power of business and sustainable partnerships. This partnership seeks to strengthen IFOSUD's efforts to advance local agriculture by empowering farmers through increased crop productivity, improved market access, access to capital, and the adoption of innovative agricultural technologies. It aims to build resilient farming communities and promote sustainable economic opportunities by offering vital resources, including financial support, technical expertise, and capacity-building initiatives.

This partnership will allow IFOSUD to strengthen the capacity of our former graduates since 2014 to present in the Farmer Field School Program. We were saddened to see how these farmers were trapped in the cycle poverty even after their graduation. They had knowledge with very few financial means left to continue to make significant investment. Hence, this partnership is aiming to enhance their positions in the Agriculture value chain and to foresee further added value activities. During this quarter, IFOSUD has already collected Crop budgets for 18 farmers and Pilot seems to be a go. An agronomist has already hired, as FFH/ FFS post-graduate Agribusiness program Manager, to run this second phase and we can't wait to see what God has in store this next step.

- 2- ARAPAZ:** is an NGO with extensive experience in humanitarian and emergency aid, aimed at civilian populations affected by both natural disasters and armed conflicts. We focus our interventions on empowering self-sufficiency and improving the quality of life of vulnerable populations anywhere in the world. IFOSUD and ARAPAZ have considered to partner in order to bring effective response to poverty and to work toward food sovereignty across vulnerable community in Haiti. Hereafter are the details of the project : The project's main objective is to promote a sustainable peasant farming system that guarantees the right of farming families in the Coq Chante community to sufficient and adequate food, as well as the creation of a community seed bank of quality seeds, ensuring their free availability in sufficient quantity within each production cycle. Family gardens will be established next to each home and will be complemented with fruit trees (soursop, bananas, and avocados). These gardens will substantially improve the family diet, which is currently very precarious. Furthermore, we propose supporting these same families by improving their cultivation of short-cycle cereals (corn, beans, and peas), the basis of their diet and their main source of income, following

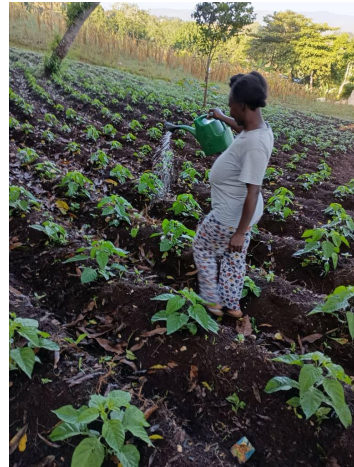
soil conservation practices that will also reduce the risk of disasters. Finally, we propose the creation of a seed bank, for both cereals and vegetables, which will improve the quality of production and prevent families from going into debt year after year before the harvests. Currently, we are serving 50 farmers of which 80% are women. They are producing multiple crops: Corn, black bean, red bean, cucumbers and congo bean. ARAPAZ

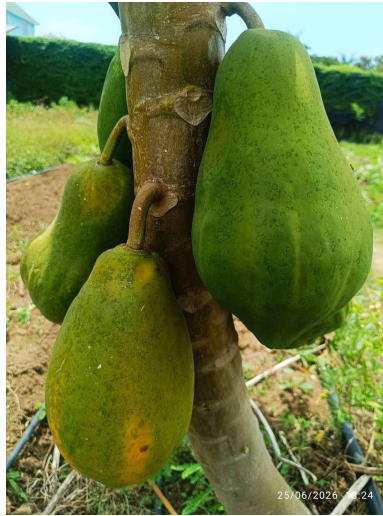

3.2 The IFOSUD John Deere tractor

The IFOSUD tractor began operating in 2014. It's clear that by 2026, it will have been in service for 12 years. Indeed, the tractor continues to run, but not with the same performance. The accessories have been fully depreciated. However, the technical team is still making repairs to keep it running. Since the dashboard is no longer functional, we are unable to estimate the mileage or the number of hours it has been used. Despite everything, the tractor continues to serve our communities. We must remember that the tractor allows us to develop strong relationships with farmers and, likewise, makes it easier for us to better evangelize those requesting our services. Therefore, the tractor accompanies us in our ministry. Even after graduation, a beneficiary from the Farmer Field School can still contact us for soil operation, and this has allowed our relationship to endure. It's not just about plowing services... but also about outreach, going from house to house to spread the Word of God.

IV- FINANCIAL REPORT

IFOSUD's balance sheet, also known as a statement of financial position, provides a snapshot of IFOSUD's financial health at a specific point in time. It outlines its assets, liabilities, and net assets. It also shows what the association owns. For the quarter ended on June 30th, 2026 the funds availability in its checking/ savings account is \$ 22,617.53 USD.

Also, from April 1st, 2026 to June 30th, 2026, IFOSUD has generated a total Gross Income of \$ 231,961.39 USD. The latter come from Grants received from Fol, IFOSUD productive farm, tractor revenue and revenue from other project in the form of loans reimbursement. The expenses made for the quarter is \$ 141,753.22 USD. Hence, based on the Profit & Loss statement for this quarter IFOSUD has obtained a Net Income of \$ 90, 208.17 USD.

V- EXPECTATIONS FOR THE NEXT QUARTER (July 1st, 2026 to September 30,2026)

For the upcoming quarter, IFOSuD expects to do the following:

- To carry out focus group discussion and survey in order to finalize the selection process of a new beneficiaries selection in Bonbon, Jeremie - Haiti
- To launch field visits for the exploration of new project communities
- Launch the final evaluation for graduating students of the FFH program before the graduation phase in October 2026
- Continue with the evaluation visit of the beneficiaries in Coq Chante, Jacmel in the framework of the project implementation with ARAPAZ.
- To launch the pilot phase of a post-graduation project (Agribusiness and microfinance program) with 20 Alumni from the Farmer Field School project in partnership with Partners Worldwide.
- To continue with evangelism movies projection in the project communities of IFOSUD

- To move forward with the discipleship program at household level and training with local leaders
- To continue with the Christian education and development program in our project communities Jeremie (1 community) , Leogane (2 communities) and Jacmel (1 community)
